

## OSHA Quickview: Recordable vs. Not Recordable **CATEGORY FIRST AID MEDICAL TREATMENT** Not Recordable Recordable Medication Over the counter medication at or above Non-prescription medications at prescription strength (e.g., Ibuprofen > non-prescription strength, whether in 400 mg, Aleve > 220 mg, Benadryl > ointment, cream, pill, liquid, spray or 50 mg) any other form Prescription medications, whether given once or over a long period of time, or whether that prescription is ever filled or not **Strains** Hot or cold therapy, massages Casts or immobilization with rigid stays Sprains Any non-rigid means of support (e.g., (e.g., finger splints) **Dislocations** bandages/wraps, non-rigid back belts, Draining of bruises by needle **Bruises** lace-up ankle supports, etc.) Crutches Contusions Finger quards Slings **Blisters** Soaking therapy Physical therapy or chiropractic Drilling a finger/toe nail or lancing manipulation a blister Cuts Any wound coverings or bandaging by Sutures/stitches Lacerations any medical personnel Staples **Punctures** Cleaning, flushing or soaking wounds Surgical glue **Abrasions** on the surface of the skin Treatment of infection with prescription **Burns** Using wound coverings (e.g., coban, medication bandages, liquid bandage, Band-Aids, Prescription strength topical ointment gauze pads, etc.) or using butterfly (e.g., Silvadene) bandages or Steri-strips Surgical debridement Use of over the counter antibiotics (cutting away dead skin) (e.g., bacitracin) **Splinters** Removing splinters or foreign material Foreign bodies that require more than **Foreign Bodies** from areas other than the eye by simple means to remove because of their location, depth of penetration, size or shape (not eyes) irrigation, tweezers, cotton swabs, needles, pins or small tools Excision of tissue Surgical procedures Embedded or adhered objects which **Eye Injuries** Removing foreign bodies from the eye require more complicated procedures using only irrigation or a cotton swab Eye patch Immunizations/ Tetanus immunization Inoculations such as gamma globulin, **Inoculations** rabies, hepatitis, etc. given to treat a Immunizations and inoculations that specific injury or illness, or in response to are provided for public health or other workplace exposure purposes, where there is no workrelated injury or illness **Heat Stress** Drinking fluids is always first aid Intravenous injections

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
